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## Part I

## User guide

- This user guide focuses on internationalization and localization with ${ }^{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$. There are also some notes on its use with Plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$.
- Changes and new features with relation to version 3.8 are highlighted with New X.XX , and there are some notes for the latest versions in the babel wiki. The most recent features could be still unstable. Please, report any issues you find in GitHub which is better than just complaining on an e-mail list or a web forum.
- If you are interested in the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ multilingual support, please join the kadingira mail list You can follow the development of babel in GitHub (which provides many sample files too).
- See section 3.1 for contributing a language.
- The first sections describe the traditional way of loading a language (with ldf files). The alternative way based on ini files, which complements the previous one (it does not replace it), is described below.


## 1 The user interface

### 1.1 Monolingual documents

In most cases, a single language is required, and then all you need in ${ }^{E_{E}} \mathrm{X}$ is to load the package using its standard mechanism for this purpose, namely, passing that language as an optional argument. In addition, you may want to set the font and input encodings. Many languages are compatible with xetex and luatex. With them you can use babel to localize the documents. When these engines are used, the Latin script is covered by default in current ${ }^{E T} T_{E} \mathrm{X}$ (provided the document encoding is UTF-8), because the font loader is preloaded and the font is switched to lmroman. Other scripts require loading fontspec. You may want to set the font attributes with fontspec, too.

EXAMPLE Here is a simple full example for "traditional" $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ engines (see below for xetex and luatex). The packages fontenc and inputenc do not belong to babel, but they are included in the example because typically you will need them (however, the package inputenc may be omitted with $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X} \geq 2018-04-01$ if the encoding is UTF-8):

```
PDFTEX \documentclass{article}
\usepackage[T1]{fontenc}
% \usepackage[utf8]{inputenc} % Uncomment if LaTeX < 2018-04-01
\usepackage[french]{babel}
\begin{document}
Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose!
\end{document}
```

EXAMPLE And now a simple monolingual document in Russian (text from the Wikipedia) with xetex or luatex. Note neither fontenc nor inputenc are necessary, but the document
should be encoded in UTF-8 and a so-called Unicode font must be loaded (in this example \babelfont is used, described below).

Luatex/Xetex

```
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[russian]{babel}
\babelfont{rm}{DejaVu Serif}
\begin{document}
Россия, находящаяся на пересечении множества культур, а также
с учётом многонационального характера её населения, - отличается
высокой степенью этнокультурного многообразия и способностью к
межкультурному диалогу.
\end{document}
```

TROUBLESHOOTING A common source of trouble is a wrong setting of the input encoding. Depending on the $\mathrm{AT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ version you could get the following somewhat cryptic error:

```
! Paragraph ended before \UTFviii@three@octets was complete.
```

Or the more explanatory:

```
! Package inputenc Error: Invalid UTF-8 byte ...
```

Make sure you set the encoding actually used by your editor.
Another approach is making the language (french in the example) a global option in order to let other packages detect and use it:

```
\documentclass[french]{article}
\usepackage{babel}
\usepackage{varioref}
```

In this last example, the package varioref will also see the option and will be able to use it.
NOTE Because of the way babel has evolved, "language" can refer to (1) a set of hyphenation patterns as preloaded into the format, (2) a package option, (3) an ldf file, and (4) a name used in the document to select a language or dialect. So, a package option refers to a language in a generic way - sometimes it is the actual language name used to select it, sometimes it is a file name loading a language with a different name, sometimes it is a file name loading several languages. Please, read the documentation for specific languages for further info.

TROUBLESHOOTING The following warning is about hyphenation patterns, which are not under the direct control of babel:
Package babel Warning:

| (babel) hyphenation patterns were preloaded for |  |
| :--- | :--- |
| (babel) | the language 'LANG' into the format. |
| (babel) | Please, configure your TeX system to add them and |
| (babel) | rebuild the format. Now I will use the patterns |

The document will be typeset, but very likely the text will not be correctly hyphenated. Some languages may be raising this warning wrongly (because they are not hyphenated); it is a bug to be fixed - just ignore it. See the manual of your distribution ( $\mathrm{MacT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}, \mathrm{MikT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}, \mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{XLive}$, etc.) for further info about how to configure it.

### 1.2 Multilingual documents

In multilingual documents, just use a list of the required languages as package or class options. The last language is considered the main one, activated by default. Sometimes, the main language changes the document layout (eg, spanish and french).

EXAMPLE In $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, the preamble of the document:

```
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[dutch,english]{babel}
```

would tell $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ that the document would be written in two languages, Dutch and English, and that English would be the first language in use, and the main one.

You can also set the main language explicitly, but it is discouraged except if there a real reason to do so:

```
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[main=english,dutch]{babel}
```

Examples of cases where main is useful are the following.
NOTE Some classes load babel with a hardcoded language option. Sometimes, the main language could be overridden with something like that before \documentclass:

```
\PassOptionsToPackage{main=english}{babel}
```

WARNING Languages may be set as global and as package option at the same time, but in such a case you should set explicitly the main language with the package option main:

```
\documentclass[italian]{book}
\usepackage[ngerman,main=italian]{babel}
```

WARNING In the preamble the main language has not been selected, except hyphenation patterns and the name assigned to \languagename (in particular, shorthands, captions and date are not activated). If you need to define boxes and the like in the preamble, you might want to use some of the language selectors described below.

To switch the language there are two basic macros, described below in detail: \selectlanguage is used for blocks of text, while \foreignlanguage is for chunks of text inside paragraphs.

EXAMPLE A full bilingual document follows. The main language is french, which is activated when the document begins. The package inputenc may be omitted with $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ $\geq 2018$-04-01 if the encoding is UTF-8.

```
PDFTEX
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[T1]{fontenc}
\usepackage[utf8]{inputenc}
\usepackage[english,french]{babel}
\begin{document}
Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose!
\selectlanguage{english}
And an English paragraph, with a short text in
\foreignlanguage{french}{français}.
\end{document}
```

EXAMPLE With xetex and luatex, the following bilingual, single script document in UTF-8 encoding just prints a couple of 'captions' and \today in Danish and Vietnamese. No additional packages are required.

## LUATEX/XETEX

```
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[vietnamese,danish]{babel}
\begin{document}
\prefacename{} -- \alsoname{} -- \today
\selectlanguage{vietnamese}
\prefacename{} -- \alsoname{} -- \today
\end{document}
```


### 1.3 Mostly monolingual documents

New 3.39 Very often, multilingual documents consist of a main language with small pieces of text in another languages (words, idioms, short sentences). Typically, all you need is to set the line breaking rules and, perhaps, the font. In such a case, babel now does not require declaring these secondary languages explicitly, because the basic settings are loaded on the fly when the language is selected (and also when provided in the optional argument of $\backslash$ babelfont, if used.)
This is particularly useful, too, when there are short texts of this kind coming from an external source whose contents are not known on beforehand (for example, titles in a bibliography). At this regard, it is worth remembering that $\backslash$ babelfont does not load any font until required, so that it can be used just in case.

EXAMPLE A trivial document is:

## LUATEX/XETEX

```
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[english]{babel}
```

```
\babelfont[russian]{rm}{FreeSerif}
\begin{document}
English. \foreignlanguage{russian}{Русский}.
\foreignlanguage{spanish}{Español}
\end{document}
```


### 1.4 Modifiers

New 3.9c The basic behavior of some languages can be modified when loading babel by means of modifiers. They are set after the language name, and are prefixed with a dot (only when the language is set as package option - neither global options nor the main key accepts them). An example is (spaces are not significant and they can be added or removed) ${ }^{1}$

```
\usepackage[latin.medieval, spanish.notilde.lcroman, danish]{babel}
```

Attributes (described below) are considered modifiers, ie, you can set an attribute by including it in the list of modifiers. However, modifiers are a more general mechanism.

### 1.5 Troubleshooting

- Loading directly sty files in thrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}}\mathrm{X}\)(ie,\usepackage$\{\langle$language$\rangle\}$)isdeprecatedandyouwillgettheerror${}^{2}$undefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefinedundefined

! Package babel Error: You are loading directly a language style.
(babel) This syntax is deprecated and you must use
(babel) \usepackage[language]{babel}.

- Another typical error when using babel is the following ${ }^{3}$

```
! Package babel Error: Unknown language `#1'. Either you have
(babel) misspelled its name, it has not been installed,
(babel) or you requested it in a previous run. Fix its name,
(babel) install it or just rerun the file, respectively. In
(babel) some cases, you may need to remove the aux file
```

The most frequent reason is, by far, the latest (for example, you included spanish, but you realized this language is not used after all, and therefore you removed it from the option list). In most cases, the error vanishes when the document is typeset again, but in more severe ones you will need to remove the aux file.

### 1.6 Plain

In Plain, load languages styles with \input and then use \begindocument (the latter is defined by babel):

\input estonian.sty
\begindocument
```

WARNING Not all languages provide a sty file and some of them are not compatible with Plain ${ }^{4}$

### 1.7 Basic language selectors

This section describes the commands to be used in the document to switch the language in multilingual documents. In most cases, only the two basic macros \selectlanguage and \foreignlanguage are necessary. The environments otherlanguage, otherlanguage* and hyphenrules are auxiliary, and described in the next section.
The main language is selected automatically when the document environment begins.
\selectlanguage

## \{〈language〉\}

When a user wants to switch from one language to another he can do so using the macro \selectlanguage. This macro takes the language, defined previously by a language definition file, as its argument. It calls several macros that should be defined in the language definition files to activate the special definitions for the language chosen:

```
\selectlanguage{german}
```

This command can be used as environment, too.
NOTE For "historical reasons", a macro name is converted to a language name without the leading \; in other words, \selectlanguage\{ \german\} is equivalent to \selectlanguage\{german\}. Using a macro instead of a "real" name is deprecated.

WARNING If used inside braces there might be some non-local changes, as this would be roughly equivalent to:
\{\selectlanguage\{<inner-language>\} ...\}\selectlanguage\{<outer-language>\}

If you want a change which is really local, you must enclose this code with an additional grouping level.
$\backslash$ foreignlanguage $\quad\{\langle$ language $\rangle\}\{\langle$ text $\rangle\}$
The command $\backslash$ foreignlanguage takes two arguments; the second argument is a phrase to be typeset according to the rules of the language named in its first one. This command (1) only switches the extra definitions and the hyphenation rules for the language, not the names and dates, (2) does not send information about the language to auxiliary files (i.e., the surrounding language is still in force), and (3) it works even if the language has not been set as package option (but in such a case it only sets the hyphenation patterns and a warning is shown). With the bidi option, it also enters in horizontal mode (this is not done always for backwards compatibility).

### 1.8 Auxiliary language selectors

```
{\langlelanguage\rangle} ... \end{otherlanguage}
```

The environment otherlanguage does basically the same as \selectlanguage, except that language change is (mostly) local to the environment.
Actually, there might be some non-local changes, as this environment is roughly equivalent to:

```
\begingroup
\selectlanguage{<inner-language>}
...
\endgroup
\selectlanguage{<outer-language>}
```

If you want a change which is really local, you must enclose this environment with an additional grouping, like braces \{\}.
Spaces after the environment are ignored.
\begin\{otherlanguage*\} }
\{〈language $\rangle$ \} ... \end\{otherlanguage*\} }
Same as \foreignlanguage but as environment. Spaces after the environment are not ignored.
This environment was originally intended for intermixing left-to-right typesetting with right-to-left typesetting in engines not supporting a change in the writing direction inside a line. However, by default it never complied with the documented behavior and it is just a version as environment of \foreignlanguage, except when the option bidi is set - in this case, \foreignlanguage emits a \leavevmode, while otherlanguage* does not.

## \begin\{hyphenrules\} \{〈language 

 \rangle \} ... \end\{hyphenrules\}}The environment hyphenrules can be used to select only the hyphenation rules to be used (it can be used as command, too). This can for instance be used to select 'nohyphenation', provided that in language. dat the 'language' nohyphenation is defined by loading zerohyph. tex. It deactivates language shorthands, too (but not user shorthands). Except for these simple uses, hyphenrules is discouraged and otherlanguage* (the starred version) is preferred, as the former does not take into account possible changes in encodings of characters like, say, ' done by some languages (eg, italian, french, ukraineb). To set hyphenation exceptions, use \babelhyphenation (see below).

### 1.9 More on selection

$\backslash$ babeltags $\quad\{\langle$ tag1 $\rangle=\langle$ language 1$\rangle,\langle$ tag 2$\rangle=\langle$ language 2$\rangle, \ldots\}$
New 3.9i In multilingual documents with many language-switches the commands above can be cumbersome. With this tool shorter names can be defined. It adds nothing really new - it is just syntactical sugar.
It defines $\backslash$ text $\langle$ tag1 $\rangle\{\langle$ text $\rangle\}$ to be $\backslash$ foreignlanguage $\{\langle$ language 1$\rangle\}\{\langle$ text $\rangle\}$, and $\backslash$ begin $\{\langle$ tag1 1$\rangle$ to be $\backslash$ begin $\{$ otherlanguage* $\}\{\langle$ language 1$\rangle\}$, and so on. Note $\backslash\langle$ tag1 $\rangle$ is also allowed, but remember to set it locally inside a group.

EXAMPLE With

[^1]```
\babeltags{de = german}
```

you can write

```
text \textde{German text} text
```

and

```
text
\begin{de}
    German text
\end{de}
text
```

NOTE Something like \babeltags\{finnish = finnish\} is legitimate - it defines \textfinnish and \finnish (and, of course, \begin\{finnish\}). }

NOTE Actually, there may be another advantage in the 'short' syntax \text $\langle$ tag $\rangle$, namely, it is not affected by \MakeUppercase (while \foreignlanguage is).
\babelensure [include=<commands $\rangle$,exclude=$\langle$ commands $\rangle$, fontenc= $=$ encoding $\rangle]\{\langle$ language $\rangle\}$
New 3.9i Except in a few languages, like russian, captions and dates are just strings, and do not switch the language. That means you should set it explicitly if you want to use them, or hyphenation (and in some cases the text itself) will be wrong. For example:

```
\foreignlanguage{russian}{text \foreignlanguage{polish}{\seename} text}
```

Of course, $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ can do it for you. To avoid switching the language all the while, \babelensure redefines the captions for a given language to wrap them with a selector:

```
\babelensure{polish}
```

By default only the basic captions and \today are redefined, but you can add further macros with the key include in the optional argument (without commas). Macros not to be modified are listed in exclude. You can also enforce a font encoding with fontenc ${ }^{5}$ A couple of examples:

```
\babelensure[include=\Today]{spanish}
\babelensure[fontenc=T5]{vietnamese}
```

They are activated when the language is selected (at the afterextras event), and it makes some assumptions which could not be fulfilled in some languages. Note also you should include only macros defined by the language, not global macros (eg, \TeX of $\backslash$ dag). With ini files (see below), captions are ensured by default.

### 1.10 Shorthands

A shorthand is a sequence of one or two characters that expands to arbitrary $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ code. Shorthands can be used for different kinds of things, for example: (1) in some languages shorthands such as "a are defined to be able to hyphenate the word if the encoding is 0T1; (2) in some languages shorthands such as! are used to insert the right amount of white space; (3) several kinds of discretionaries and breaks can be inserted easily with "-, "=, etc. The package inputenc as well as xetex and luatex have alleviated entering non-ASCII characters, but minority languages and some kinds of text can still require characters not directly available on the keyboards (and sometimes not even as separated or precomposed Unicode characters). As to the point 2, now pdfTeX provides $\backslash$ knbccode, and luatex can manipulate the glyph list. Tools for point 3 can be still very useful in general.
There are three levels of shorthands: user, language, and system (by order of precedence). Version 3.9 introduces the language user level on top of the user level, as described below. In most cases, you will use only shorthands provided by languages.

NOTE Note the following:

1. Activated chars used for two-char shorthands cannot be followed by a closing brace \} and the spaces following are gobbled. With one-char shorthands (eg, :), they are preserved.
2. If on a certain level (system, language, user) there is a one-char shorthand, two-char ones starting with that char and on the same level are ignored.
3. Since they are active, a shorthand cannot contain the same character in its definition (except if it is deactivated with, eg, \string).

TROUBLESHOOTING A typical error when using shorthands is the following:
! Argument of \language@active@arg" has an extra \}.

It means there is a closing brace just after a shorthand, which is not allowed (eg, "\}). Just add \{\} after (eg, " \{\}\}).
\shorthandon \shorthandoff

```
{\langleshorthands-list\rangle}
* {\langleshorthands-list\rangle}
```

It is sometimes necessary to switch a shorthand character off temporarily, because it must be used in an entirely different way. For this purpose, the user commands \shorthandoff and \shorthandon are provided. They each take a list of characters as their arguments. The command $\backslash$ shor thandoff sets the \catcode for each of the characters in its argument to other (12); the command \shorthandon sets the \catcode to active (13). Both commands only work on 'known' shorthand characters.
New 3.9a However, \shorthandoff does not behave as you would expect with characters like ~ or $\wedge$, because they usually are not "other". For them \shorthandoff* is provided, so that with

```
\shorthandoff*{~^}
```

~ is still active, very likely with the meaning of a non-breaking space, and ${ }^{\wedge}$ is the superscript character. The catcodes used are those when the shorthands are defined, usually when language files are loaded.
If you do not need shorthands, or prefer an alternative approach of your own, you may want to switch them off with the package option shorthands=off, as described below.
\useshorthands * $\{\langle$ char $\rangle\}$
The command \useshorthands initiates the definition of user-defined shorthand sequences. It has one argument, the character that starts these personal shorthands. New 3.9a User shorthands are not always alive, as they may be deactivated by languages (for example, if you use " for your user shorthands and switch from german to french, they stop working). Therefore, a starred version \useshorthands*\{$\langle\langle$ char $\rangle\}$ is provided, which makes sure shorthands are always activated.
Currently, if the package option shorthands is used, you must include any character to be activated with \useshorthands. This restriction will be lifted in a future release.
$\backslash d e f i n e s h o r t h a n d$

```
[\langlelanguage\rangle, <language\rangle ,...]{\langleshorthand \rangle}{\langlecode\rangle}
```

The command \defineshorthand takes two arguments: the first is a one- or two-character shorthand sequence, and the second is the code the shorthand should expand to.
New 3.9a An optional argument allows to (re)define language and system shorthands (some languages do not activate shorthands, so you may want to add \languageshorthands $\{\langle$ lang $\rangle\}$ to the corresponding \extras〈lang $\rangle$, as explained below). By default, user shorthands are (re)defined.
User shorthands override language ones, which in turn override system shorthands. Language-dependent user shorthands (new in 3.9) take precedence over "normal" user shorthands.

EXAMPLE Let's assume you want a unified set of shorthand for discretionaries (languages do not define shorthands consistently, and "-, \-, "= have different meanings). You could start with, say:

```
\useshorthands*{"}
\defineshorthand{"*}{\babelhyphen{soft}}
\defineshorthand{"-}{\babelhyphen{hard}}
```

However, the behavior of hyphens is language-dependent. For example, in languages like Polish and Portuguese, a hard hyphen inside compound words are repeated at the beginning of the next line. You could then set:

```
\defineshorthand[*polish,*portugese]{"-}{\babelhyphen{repeat}}
```

Here, options with * set a language-dependent user shorthand, which means the generic one above only applies for the rest of languages; without * they would (re)define the language shorthands instead, which are overridden by user ones.
Now, you have a single unified shorthand ("-), with a content-based meaning ('compound word hyphen') whose visual behavior is that expected in each context.

```
{\langlelanguage\rangle}
```

The command \languageshorthands can be used to switch the shorthands on the language level. It takes one argument, the name of a language or none (the latter does what its name suggests) ${ }^{6}$ Note that for this to work the language should have been specified as an option when loading the babel package. For example, you can use in english the shorthands defined by ngerman with

[^3]```
\addto\extrasenglish{\languageshorthands{ngerman}}
```

(You may also need to activate them as user shorthands in the preamble with, for example, \useshorthands or \useshorthands*.)

EXAMPLE Very often, this is a more convenient way to deactivate shorthands than \shor thandoff, for example if you want to define a macro to easy typing phonetic characters with tipa:

```
\newcommand{\myipa}[1]{{\languageshorthands{none}\tipaencoding#1}}
```

With this command you can use a shorthand even if (1) not activated in shorthands (in this case only shorthands for the current language are taken into account, ie, not user shorthands), (2) turned off with \shor thandoff or (3) deactivated with the internal \bbl@deactivate; for example, \babelshorthand\{"u\} or \babelshorthand\{:\}. (You can conveniently define your own macros, or even your own user shorthands provided they do not overlap.)

EXAMPLE Since by default shorthands are not activated until \begin\{document\}, you may } use this macro when defining the \title in the preamble:

```
\title{Documento científico\babelshorthand{"-}técnico}
```

For your records, here is a list of shorthands, but you must double check them, as they may change ${ }^{7}$

Languages with no shorthands Croatian, English (any variety), Indonesian, Hebrew, Interlingua, Irish, Lower Sorbian, Malaysian, North Sami, Romanian, Scottish, Welsh Languages with only " as defined shorthand character Albanian, Bulgarian, Danish, Dutch, Finnish, German (old and new orthography, also Austrian), Icelandic, Italian, Norwegian, Polish, Portuguese (also Brazilian), Russian, Serbian (with Latin script), Slovene, Swedish, Ukrainian, Upper Sorbian

```
Basque " ' ~
Breton : ; ? !
Catalan " ' `
Czech " -
Esperanto ^
Estonian " ~
French (all varieties) : ; ? !
Galician " . ' ~ < >
Greek ~
Hungarian
Kurmanji ^
Latin " ^ =
Slovak " ^ ' -
Spanish " . < > ' ~
Turkish : ! =
```

In addition, the babel core declares $\sim$ as a one-char shorthand which is let, like the standard $\sim$, to a non breaking space ${ }^{8}$

[^4]```
\ifbabelshorthand {\langlecharacter\rangle}{\langletrue\rangle}{\langlefalse\rangle}
```

New 3.23 Tests if a character has been made a shorthand.
$\{\langle$ original $\rangle\}\{\langle$ alias $\rangle\}$
The command \aliasshor thand can be used to let another character perform the same functions as the default shorthand character. If one prefers for example to use the character / over " in typing Polish texts, this can be achieved by entering \aliasshorthand\{"\}\{/\}. For the reasons in the warning below, usage of this macro is not recommended.

NOTE The substitute character must not have been declared before as shorthand (in such a case, \aliashorthands is ignored).

EXAMPLE The following example shows how to replace a shorthand by another

```
\aliasshorthand{~}{^}
\AtBeginDocument{\shorthandoff*{~}}
```

WARNING Shorthands remember somehow the original character, and the fallback value is that of the latter. So, in this example, if no shorthand if found, $\wedge$ expands to a non-breaking space, because this is the value of ~ (internally, ^ still calls \active@char~ or \normal@char~). Furthermore, if you change the system value of $\wedge$ with \defineshorthand nothing happens.

### 1.11 Package options

New 3.9a These package options are processed before language options, so that they are taken into account irrespective of its order. The first three options have been available in previous versions.

Tells babel not to deactivate shorthands after loading a language file, so that they are also available in the preamble.

For some languages babel supports this options to set ' as a shorthand in case it is not done by default.
activegrave Same for `.
shorthands $=\langle$ char $\rangle\langle$ char $\rangle \ldots \mid$ off

With shorthands=off no language shorthands are defined, As some languages use this mechanism for tools not available otherwise, a macro \babelshorthand is defined, which allows using them; see above.

Some $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ macros are redefined so that using shorthands is safe．With safe＝bib only \nocite，\bibcite and \bibitem are redefined．With safe＝ref only \newlabel，\ref and \pageref are redefined（as well as a few macros from varioref and ifthen）． With safe＝none no macro is redefined．This option is strongly recommended，because a good deal of incompatibilities and errors are related to these redefinitions．As of New 3.34 ，in $\epsilon \mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ based engines（ie，almost every engine except the oldest ones） shorthands can be used in these macros（formerly you could not）．

Prints to the log the list of languages loaded when the format was created：number （remember dialects can share it），name，hyphenation file and exceptions file．

### 1.13 ini files

An alternative approach to define a language (or, more precisely, a locale) is by means of an ini file. Currently babel provides about 200 of these files containing the basic data required for a locale.
ini files are not meant only for babel, and they has been devised as a resource for other packages. To easy interoperability between $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ and other systems, they are identified with the BCP 47 codes as preferred by the Unicode Common Language Data Repository, which was used as source for most of the data provided by these files, too (the main exception being the $\backslash$. . . name strings).
Most of them set the date, and many also the captions (Unicode and LICR). They will be evolving with the time to add more features (something to keep in mind if backward compatibility is important). The following section shows how to make use of them currently (by means of \babelprovide), but a higher interface, based on package options, in under study. In other words, \babelprovide is mainly meant for auxiliary tasks.

EXAMPLE Although Georgian has its own ldf file, here is how to declare this language with an ini file in Unicode engines.

NOTE The ini files just define and set some parameters, but the corresponding behavior is not always implemented. Also, there are some limitations in the engines. A few remarks follows:

Arabic Monolingual documents mostly work in luatex, but it must be fine tuned, and a recent version of fontspec/loaotfload is required. In xetex babel resorts to the bidi package, which seems to work.
Hebrew Niqqud marks seem to work in both engines, but cantillation marks are misplaced (xetex seems better, but still problematic).
Devanagari In luatex many fonts work, but some others do not, the main issue being the 'ra'. It is advisable to set explicitly the script to either deva or dev2, eg:

Other Indic scripts are still under development in luatex. On the other hand, xetex is better. The upcoming lualatex will be based on luahbtex, so Indic scripts will be rendered correctly with the option Renderer=Harfbuzz in FONTSPEC.
Southeast scripts Thai works in both luatex and xetex, but line breaking differs (rules can be modified in luatex; they are hard-coded in xetex). Lao seems to work, too, but there are no patterns for the latter in luatex. Khemer clusters are rendered wrongly. The comment about Indic scripts and lualatex also applies here. Some quick patterns could help, with something similar to:

East Asia scripts Settings for either Simplified of Traditional should work out of the box. luatex does basic line breaking, but currently xetex does not (you may load zhspacing). Although for a few words and shorts texts the ini files should be fine, CJK texts are best set with a dedicated framework (CJK, luatexja, kotex, CTeX, etc.). This is what the class ltjbook does with luatex, which can be used in conjunction with the ldf for japanese, because the following piece of code loads luatexja:

NOTE Wikipedia defines a locale as follows: "In computing, a locale is a set of parameters that defines the user's language, region and any special variant preferences that the user wants to see in their user interface. Usually a locale identifier consists of at least a language code and a country/region code." Babel is moving gradually from the old and fuzzy concept of language to the more modern of locale. Note each locale is by itself a separate "language", which explains why there are so many files. This is on purpose, so that possible variants can be created and/or redefined easily.

## Modifying and adding values to ini files

New 3.39 There is a way to modify the values of ini files when they get loaded with \babelprovide and import. To set, say, digits. native in the numbers section, use something like numbers/digits.native=abcdefghij. Keys may be added, too. Without import you may modify the identification keys.
This can be used to create private variants easily. All you need is to import the same ini file with a different locale name and different parameters.

### 1.14 Selecting fonts

New 3.15 Babel provides a high level interface on top of fontspec to select fonts. There is no need to load fontspec explicitly - babel does it for you with the first $\backslash$ babelfont ${ }^{14}$
\babelfont [ language-list $\rangle]\{\langle$ font-family $\rangle\}[\langle$ font-options $\rangle]\{\langle$ font-name $\rangle\}$
The main purpose of $\backslash$ babelfont is to define at once in a multilingual document the fonts required by the different languages, with their corresponding language systems (script and language). So, if you load, say, 4 languages, \babelfont $\{r m\}\{$ FreeSerif $\}$ defines 4 fonts (with their variants, of course), which are switched with the language by babel. It is a tool to make things easier and transparent to the user.
Here font-family is rm, sf or tt (or newly defined ones, as explained below), and font-name is the same as in fontspec and the like.
If no language is given, then it is considered the default font for the family, activated when a language is selected.
On the other hand, if there is one or more languages in the optional argument, the font will be assigned to them, overriding the default one. Alternatively, you may set a font for a script - just precede its name (lowercase) with a star (eg, *devanagari). With this optional argument, the font is not yet defined, but just predeclared. This means you may define as many fonts as you want 'just in case', because if the language is never selected, the corresponding \babelfont declaration is just ignored.
Babel takes care of the font language and the font script when languages are selected (as well as the writing direction); see the recognized languages above. In most cases, you will not need font-options, which is the same as in fontspec, but you may add further key/value pairs if necessary.

EXAMPLE Usage in most cases is very simple. Let us assume you are setting up a document in Swedish, with some words in Hebrew, with a font suited for both languages.

LUATEX/XETEX
\documentclass{article}
\usepackage[swedish, bidi=default]{babel}
\babelprovide[import]{hebrew}
\babelfont{rm}{FreeSerif}
\begin{document}

If on the other hand you have to resort to different fonts, you could replace the red line above with, say:

## LUATEX/XETEX

```
\babelfont{rm}{Iwona}
\babelfont[hebrew]{rm}{FreeSerif}
```

\babelfont can be used to implicitly define a new font family. Just write its name instead of rm , sf or tt . This is the preferred way to select fonts in addition to the three basic families.

EXAMPLE Here is how to do it:

```
LUATEX/XETEX
\babelfont{kai}{FandolKai}
```

Now, \kaifamily and \kaidefault, as well as \textkai are at your disposal.
NOTE You may load fontspec explicitly. For example:

```
\usepackage{fontspec}
\newfontscript{Devanagari}{deva}
\babelfont[hindi]{rm}{Shobhika}
```

This makes sure the OpenType script for Devanagari is deva and not dev2, in case it is not detected correctly. You may also pass some options to fontspec: with silent, the warnings about unavailable scripts or languages are not shown (they are only really useful when the document format is being set up).

NOTE Directionality is a property affecting margins, indentation, column order, etc., not just text. Therefore, it is under the direct control of the language, which applies both the script and the direction to the text. As a consequence, there is no need to set Script when declaring a font with \babelfont (nor Language). In fact, it is even discouraged.

NOTE \fontspec is not touched at all, only the preset font families (rm, $s f, t \mathrm{t}$, and the like). If a language is switched when an ad hoc font is active, or you select the font with this command, neither the script nor the language is passed. You must add them by hand. This is by design, for several reasons - for example, each font has its own set of features and a generic setting for several of them could be problematic, and also a "lower-level" font selection is useful.

NOTE The keys Language and Script just pass these values to the font, and do not set the script for the language (and therefore the writing direction). In other words, the ini file or \babelprovide provides default values for \babelfont if omitted, but the opposite is not true. See the note above for the reasons of this behavior.

WARNING Using \setxxxxfont and \babelfont at the same time is discouraged, but very often works as expected. However, be aware with \setxxxxfont the language system will not be set by babel and should be set with fontspec if necessary.

TROUBLESHOOTING Package fontspec Warning: 'Language 'LANG' not available for font 'FONT' with script 'SCRIPT' 'Default' language used instead'.
This is not and error. This warning is shown by fontspec, not by babel. It could be irrelevant for English, but not for many other languages, including Urdu and Turkish. This is a useful and harmless warning, and if everything is fine with your document the best thing you can do is just to ignore it altogether.

TROUBLESHOOTING Package babel Info: The following fonts are not babel standard families.

This is not and error. babel assumes that if you are using \babelfont for a family, very likely you want to define the rest of them. If you don't, you can find some inconsistencies between families. This checking is done at the beginning of the document, at a point where we cannot know which families will be used.
Actually, there is no real need to use \babelfont in a monolingual document, if you set the language system in \setmainfont (or not, depending on what you want).

As the message explains, there is nothing intrinsically wrong with not defining all the families. In fact, there is nothing intrinsically wrong with not using \babelfont at all. But you must be aware that this may lead to some problems.

### 1.15 Modifying a language

Modifying the behavior of a language (say, the chapter "caption"), is sometimes necessary, but not always trivial.

- The old way, still valid for many languages, to redefine a caption is the following:

```
\addto\captionsenglish{%
    \renewcommand\contentsname{Foo}%
}
```

As of 3.15 , there is no need to hide spaces with \% (babel removes them), but it is advisable to do so.

- The new way, which is found in bulgarian, azerbaijani, spanish, french, turkish, icelandic, vietnamese and a few more, as well as in languages created with \babelprovide and its key import, is:
}
- Macros to be run when a language is selected can be add to \extras〈lang〉:
\addto\extrasrussian\{ \mymacro\}

There is a counterpart for code to be run when a language is unselected： \noextras〈lang〉．

NOTE Do not redefine a caption in the following way：
\AtBeginDocument \｛}\}

The changes may be discarded with a language selector，and the original value restored．
NOTE These macros（\captions〈lang〉，\extras〈lang〉）may be redefined，but must not be used as such－they just pass information to babel，which executes them in the proper context．

Another way to modify a language loaded as a package or class option is by means of \babelprovide，described below in depth．So，something like：

```
\usepackage[danish]{babel}
\babelprovide[captions=da,hyphenrules=nohyphenation]{danish}
```

first loads danish．ldf，and then redefines the captions for danish（as provided by the ini file）and prevents hyphenation．The rest of the language definitions are not touched．

## 1．16 Creating a language

New 3．10 And what if there is no style for your language or none fits your needs？You may then define quickly a language with the help of the following macro in the preamble （which may be used to modify an existing language，too，as explained in the previous subsection）．

## ［〈options $\rangle]\{\langle$ language－name $\rangle\}$

If the language 〈language－name〉 has not been loaded as class or package option and there are no $\langle$ options $\rangle$ ，it creates an＂empty＂one with some defaults in its internal structure：the hyphen rules，if not available，are set to the current ones，left and right hyphen mins are set to 2 and 3．In either case，caption，date and language system are not defined．
If no ini file is imported with import，〈language－name〉 is still relevant because in such a case the hyphenation and like breaking rules（including those for South East Asian and CJK ）are based on it as provided in the ini file corresponding to that name；the same applies to OpenType language and script．
Conveniently，some options allow to fill the language，and babel warns you about what to do if there is a missing string．Very likely you will find alerts like that in the log file：

```
Package babel Warning: \mylangchaptername not set. Please, define
(babel) it in the preamble with something like:
(babel) \renewcommand\maylangchaptername{..}
(babel) Reported on input line 18.
```

In most cases，you will only need to define a few macros．
EXAMPLE If you need a language named arhinish：

```
\usepackage[danish]{babel}
\babelprovide{arhinish}
\renewcommand\arhinishchaptername{Chapitula}

EXAMPLE Locales with names based on BCP 47 codes can be created with something like：

Unicode engines load the UTF－8 variants，while 8－bit engines load the LICR（ie，with macros like \＇or \ss）ones．
New 3．23 It may be used without a value．In such a case，the ini file set in the corresponding babel－＜language＞．tex（where＜language＞is the last argument in \babelprovide）is imported．See the list of recognized languages above．So，the previous example could be written：

```
\babelprovide[import]{hungarian}
```

There are about 200 ini files，with data taken from the ldf files and the CLDR provided by Unicode．Not all languages in the latter are complete，and therefore neither are the ini files．A few languages will show a warning about the current lack of suitability of the date format（french，breton，and occitan）．
Besides \today，this option defines an additional command for dates：\＜language＞date， which takes three arguments，namely，year，month and day numbers．In fact，\today calls \＜language＞today，which in turn calls $\backslash<$ language $>$ date $\{\backslash$ the $\backslash$ year $\}\{\backslash$ the $\backslash m o n t h\}\{\backslash$ the $\backslash$ day $\}$ ．
captions＝〈language－tag〉
Loads only the strings．For example：

```
\babelprovide[captions=hu]{hungarian}
```

hyphenrules＝〈language－list $\rangle$
With this option，with a space－separated list of hyphenation rules，babel assigns to the language the first valid hyphenation rules in the list．For example：

```
\babelprovide[hyphenrules=chavacano spanish italian]{chavacano}
```

If none of the listed hyphenrules exist, the default behavior applies. Note in this example we set chavacano as first option - without it, it would select spanish even if chavacano exists.
A special value is + , which allocates a new language (in the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ sense). It only makes sense as the last value (or the only one; the subsequent ones are silently ignored). It is mostly useful with luatex, because you can add some patterns with \babelpatterns, as for example:

```
\babelprovide[hyphenrules=+]{neo}
\babelpatterns[neo]{a1 e1 i1 o1 u1}
```

In other engines it just suppresses hyphenation (because the pattern list is empty).

This valueless option makes the language the main one. Only in newly defined languages.
script $=\langle$ script-name $\rangle$
New 3.15 Sets the script name to be used by fontspec (eg, Devanagari). Overrides the value in the ini file. If fontspec does not define it, then babel sets its tag to that provided by the ini file. This value is particularly important because it sets the writing direction, so you must use it if for some reason the default value is wrong.
language $=$ 〈language-name〉
New 3.15 Sets the language name to be used by fontspec (eg, Hindi). Overrides the value in the ini file. If fontspec does not define it, then babel sets its tag to that provided by the ini file. Not so important, but sometimes still relevant.

A few options (only luatex) set some properties of the writing system used by the language. These properties are always applied to the script, no matter which language is active. Although somewhat inconsistent, this makes setting a language up easier in most typical cases.
onchar= ids|fonts
New 3.38 This option is much like an 'event' called when a character belonging to the script of this locale is found. There are currently two 'actions', which can be used at the same time (separated by a space): with ids the \language and the \localeid are set to the values of this locale; with fonts, the fonts are changed to those of this locale (as set with \babelfont). This option is not compatible with mapfont. Characters can be added with \babelcharproperty.

## mapfont= direction

Assigns the font for the writing direction of this language (only with bidi=basic).
Whenever possible, instead of this option use onchar, based on the script, which usually makes more sense. More precisely, what mapfont=direction means is, 'when a character has the same direction as the script for the "provided" language, then change its font to that set for this language'. There are 3 directions, following the bidi Unicode algorithm, namely, Arabic-like, Hebrew-like and left to right. So, there should be at most 3 directives of this kind.
intraspace $=\langle$ base $\rangle\langle$ shrink $\rangle\langle$ stretch $\rangle$
Sets the interword space for the writing system of the language, in em units (so, 0.10 is 0 em plus . 1 em ). Like $\backslash$ spaceskip, the em unit applied is that of the current text (more
precisely, the previous glyph). Currently used only in Southeast Asian scrips, like Thai, and CJK.
intrapenalty= $\langle$ penalty $\rangle$
Sets the interword penalty for the writing system of this language. Currently used only in Southeast Asian scrips, like Thai. Ignored if 0 (which is the default value).

NOTE (1) If you need shorthands, you can define them with \useshorthands and $\backslash$ defineshorthand as described above. (2) Captions and \today are "ensured" with \babelensure (this is the default in ini-based languages).

### 1.17 Digits and counters

New 3.20 About thirty ini files define a field named digits.native. When it is present, two macros are created: \<language>digits and $\backslash<$ language>counter (only xetex and luatex). With the first, a string of 'Latin’ digits are converted to the native digits of that language; the second takes a counter name as argument. With the option maparabic in \babelprovide, \arabic is redefined to produce the native digits (this is done globally, to avoid inconsistencies in, for example, page numbering, and note as well dates do not rely on \arabic.)
For example:

```
\babelprovide[import]{telugu} % Telugu better with XeTeX
    % Or also, if you want:
    % \babelprovide[import, maparabic]{telugu}
\babelfont{rm}{Gautami}
\begin{document}

New 3.30 With luatex there is an alternative approach for mapping digits, namely, mapdigits. Conversion is based on the language and it is applied to the typeset text (not math, PDF bookmarks, etc.) before bidi and fonts are processed (ie, to the node list as generated by the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ code). This means the local digits have the correct bidirectional behavior (unlike Numbers=Arabic in fontspec, which is not recommended).
New 4.41 Many 'ini' locale files has been extended with information about non-positional numerical systems, based on those predefined in CSS. They only work with xetex and luatex and are fully expendable (even inside an \edef). Currently, they are limited to numbers below 10000.
There are several ways to use them (for the availabe styles in each language, see the list below):

- \localenumeral\{〈style $\rangle\}\{\langle$ number $\rangle$ \}, like \localenumeral\{abjad\}\{15\}
- \localecounter $\{\langle$ style $\rangle\}\{\langle$ counter $\rangle\}$, like \localecounter \{lower\} \{section\}
- In \babelprovide, as an argument to the keys alph and Alph, which redefine what $\backslash a l p h$ and $\backslash A l p h$ print. For example:
\babelprovide[alph=alphabetic]\{thai\}

### 1.18 Accessing language info

\iflanguage

If more than one language is used, it might be necessary to know which language is active at a specific time. This can be checked by a call to \iflanguage, but note here "language" is used in the $\mathrm{T}_{E} \mathrm{X}$ sense, as a set of hyphenation patterns, and not as its babel name. This macro takes three arguments. The first argument is the name of a language; the second and third arguments are the actions to take if the result of the test is true or false respectively.
\localeinfo $\{\langle$ field $\rangle\}$
New 3.38 If an ini file has been loaded for the current language, you may access the information stored in it. This macros is fully expandable and the available fields are:
name. english as provided by the Unicode CLDR.

## \getlocaleproperty

$\{\langle$ macro $\rangle\}\{\langle$ locale $\rangle\}\{\langle$ property $\rangle\}$
New 3.42 The value of any locale property as set by the ini files (or added/modified with $\backslash$ babelprovide) can be retrieved and stored in a macro with this command. For example, after:
\getlocaleproperty\hechap\{hebrew\}\{captions/chapter\}
the macro \hechap will contain the string פרק.
Babel remembers which ini files have been loaded. There is a loop named \LocaleForEach to traverse the list, where \#1 is the name of the current item, so that \LocaleForEach\{\message\{ **\#1** \}\} just shows the loaded ini’s.

NOTE ini files are loaded with \babelprovide and also when languages are selected if there is a \babelfont. To ensure the ini files are loaded (and therefore the corresponding data) even if these two conditions are not met, write $\backslash$ BabelEnsureInfo in the preamble.

### 1.19 Hyphenation and line breaking

Babel deals with three kinds of line breaking rules: Western, typically the LGC group, South East Asian, like Thai, and CJK, but support depends on the engine: pdftex only deals with the former, xetex also with the second one, while luatex provides basic rules for the latter, too.

## \babelhyphen <br> \babelhyphen <br> $*\{\langle$ type $\rangle\}$ $*\{\langle$ text $\rangle\}$

tag. ini is the tag of the ini file (the way this file is identified in its name).
tag.bcp47 is the BCP 47 language tag.
tag. opentype is the tag used by OpenType (usually, but not always, the same as BCP 47). script. name as provided by the Unicode CLDR.
script.tag.bcp47 is the BCP 47 language tag of the script used by this locale.
script.tag.opentype is the tag used by OpenType (usually, but not always, the same as BCP 47).

New 3.9a It is customary to classify hyphens in two types: (1) explicit or hard hyphens, which in $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ are entered as -, and (2) optional or soft hyphens, which are entered as $\backslash$-. Strictly, a soft hyphen is not a hyphen, but just a breaking opportunity or, in $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ terms, a "discretionary"; a hard hyphen is a hyphen with a breaking opportunity after it. A further type is a non-breaking hyphen, a hyphen without a breaking opportunity. In $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, - and $\backslash$ - forbid further breaking opportunities in the word. This is the desired behavior very often, but not always, and therefore many languages provide shorthands for these cases. Unfortunately, this has not been done consistently: for example, " - in Dutch, Portuguese, Catalan or Danish is a hard hyphen, while in German, Spanish, Norwegian, Slovak or Russian is a soft hyphen. Furthermore, some of them even redefine $\backslash-$, so that you cannot insert a soft hyphen without breaking opportunities in the rest of the word. Therefore, some macros are provided with a set of basic "hyphens" which can be used by themselves, to define a user shorthand, or even in language files.

- \babelhyphen\{soft\} and \babelhyphen\{hard\} are self explanatory.
- \babelhyphen\{repeat inserts a hard hyphen which is repeated at the beginning of the next line, as done in languages like Polish, Portuguese and Spanish.
- \babelhyphen\{nobreak\} inserts a hard hyphen without a break after it (even if a space follows).
- \babelhyphen\{empty\} inserts a break opportunity without a hyphen at all.
- \babelhyphen $\{\langle$ text $\rangle$ \} is a hard "hyphen" using $\langle$ text $\rangle$ instead. A typical case is \babelhyphen\{/\}.

With all of them, hyphenation in the rest of the word is enabled. If you don't want to enable it, there is a starred counterpart: \babelhyphen*\{soft\} (which in most cases is equivalent to the original $\backslash-$ ), \babelhyphen*\{hard\}, etc.
Note hard is also good for isolated prefixes (eg, anti-) and nobreak for isolated suffixes (eg, -ism), but in both cases \babelhyphen*\{nobreak\} is usually better.
There are also some differences with $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ : (1) the character used is that set for the current font, while in $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ it is hardwired to - (a typical value); (2) the hyphen to be used in fonts with a negative \hyphenchar is -, like in $\mathrm{ETEX}_{\mathrm{E}}$, but it can be changed to another value by redefining \babelnullhyphen; (3) a break after the hyphen is forbidden if preceded by a glue $>0 \mathrm{pt}$ (at the beginning of a word, provided it is not immediately preceded by, say, a parenthesis).
$[\langle$ language $\rangle,\langle$ language $\rangle, \ldots]\{\langle$ exceptions $\rangle\}$
New 3.9a Sets hyphenation exceptions for the languages given or, without the optional argument, for all languages (eg, proper nouns or common loan words, and of course monolingual documents). Language exceptions take precedence over global ones. It can be used only in the preamble, and exceptions are set when the language is first selected, thus taking into account changes of \lccodes's done in \extras $\langle$ lang $\rangle$ as well as the language-specific encoding (not set in the preamble by default). Multiple \babelhyphenation's are allowed. For example:

```
\babelhyphenation{Wal-hal-la Dar-bhan-ga}
```

Listed words are saved expanded and therefore it relies on the LICR. Of course, it also works without the LICR if the input and the font encodings are the same, like in Unicode based engines.

NOTE Using \babelhyphenation with Southeast Asian scripts is mostly pointless. But with \babelpatterns (below) you may fine-tune line breaking (only luatex). Even if there are no patterns for the language, you can add at least some typical cases.
\babelpatterns
[ $\langle$ language $\rangle,\langle$ language $\rangle, \ldots]\{\langle$ patterns $\rangle\}$
New 3.9 m In luatex only ${ }^{15}$ adds or replaces patterns for the languages given or, without the optional argument, for all languages. If a pattern for a certain combination already exists, it gets replaced by the new one.
It can be used only in the preamble, and patterns are added when the language is first selected, thus taking into account changes of \lccodes's done in \extras $\langle$ lang $\rangle$ as well as the language-specific encoding (not set in the preamble by default). Multiple \babelpatterns's are allowed.
Listed patterns are saved expanded and therefore it relies on the LICR. Of course, it also works without the LICR if the input and the font encodings are the same, like in Unicode based engines.

[^9]New 3.31 (Only luatex.) With \babelprovide and imported CJK languages, a simple generic line breaking algorithm (push-out-first) is applied, based on a selection of the Unicode rules ( New 3.32 it is disabled in verbatim mode, or more precisely when the hyphenrules are set to nohyphenation). It can be activated alternatively by setting explicitly the intraspace.
New 3.27 Interword spacing for Thai, Lao and Khemer is activated automatically if a language with one of those scripts are loaded with \babelprovide. See the sample on the babel repository. With both Unicode engines, spacing is based on the "current" em unit (the size of the previous char in luatex, and the font size set by the last \selectfont in xetex).

New 3.37-3.39 With luatex it is now possible to define non-standard hyphenation rules, like $f-f \rightarrow f f-f$, repeated hyphens, ranked ruled (or more precisely, 'penalized' hyphenation points), and so on. No rules are currently provided by default, but they can be defined as shown in the following example, where \{1\} is the first captured char (between ( ) in the pattern):

This feature is activated with the first $\backslash$ babelposthyphenation.
See the babel wiki for a more detailed description and some examples. It also describes an additional replacement type with the key string.

EXAMPLE Although the main purpose of this command is non-standard hyphenation, it may actually be used for other transformations (after hyphenation is applied, so you must take discretionaries into account). For example, you can use the string replacement to replace a character (or series of them) by another character (or series of them). Thus, to enter $\check{z}$ as $z h$ and $\check{s}$ as sh in a newly created locale for transliterated Russian:

In other words, it is a quite general tool. (A counterpart \babelprehyphenation is on the way.)

### 1.20 Selecting scripts

Currently babel provides no standard interface to select scripts, because they are best selected with either \fontencoding (low-level) or a language name (high-level). Even the

Latin script may require different encodings (ie, sets of glyphs) depending on the language, and therefore such a switch would be in a sense incomplete ${ }^{16}$
Some languages sharing the same script define macros to switch it (eg, \textcyrillic), but be aware they may also set the language to a certain default. Even the babel core defined \textlatin, but is was somewhat buggy because in some cases it messed up encodings and fonts (for example, if the main Latin encoding was LY1), and therefore it has been deprecated ${ }^{17}$
\ensureascii $\{\langle$ text $\rangle\}$
New 3.9i This macro makes sure $\langle$ text $\rangle$ is typeset with a LICR-savvy encoding in the ASCII range. It is used to redefine \TeX and \LaTeX so that they are correctly typeset even with LGR or X2 (the complete list is stored in \BabelNonASCII, which by default is LGR, X2, OT2, OT3, OT6, LHE, LWN, LMA, LMC, LMS, LMU, but you can modify it). So, in some sense it fixes the bug described in the previous paragraph.
If non-ASCII encodings are not loaded (or no encoding at all), it is no-op (also $\backslash \mathrm{TeX}$ and $\backslash$ LaTeX are not redefined); otherwise, \ensureascii switches to the encoding at the beginning of the document if ASCII-savvy, or else the last ASCII-savvy encoding loaded. For example, if you load LY1, LGR, then it is set to LY1, but if you load LY1,T2A it is set to T2A. The symbol encodings TS1, T3, and TS3 are not taken into account, since they are not used for "ordinary" text (they are stored in \BabelNonText, used in some special cases when no Latin encoding is explicitly set).
The foregoing rules (which are applied "at begin document") cover most of the cases. No assumption is made on characters above 127, which may not follow the LICR conventions the goal is just to ensure most of the ASCII letters and symbols are the right ones.

### 1.21 Selecting directions

No macros to select the writing direction are provided, either - writing direction is intrinsic to each script and therefore it is best set by the language (which could be a dummy one). Furthermore, there are in fact two right-to-left modes, depending on the language, which differ in the way 'weak' numeric characters are ordered (eg, Arabic \%123 vs Hebrew 123\%).

WARNING The current code for text in luatex should be considered essentially stable, but, of course, it is not bug-free and there could be improvements in the future, because setting bidi text has many subtleties (see for example
[https://www.w3.org/TR/html-bidi/](https://www.w3.org/TR/html-bidi/)). A basic stable version for other engines must wait. This applies to text; there is a basic support for graphical elements, including the picture environment (with pict2e) and pfg/tikz. Also, indexes and the like are under study, as well as math (there is progress in the latter, too, but for example cases may fail).
An effort is being made to avoid incompatibilities in the future (this one of the reason currently bidi must be explicitly requested as a package option, with a certain bidi model, and also the layout options described below).

WARNING If characters to be mirrored are shown without changes with luatex, try with the following line:

There are some package options controlling bidi writing.
bidi= default|basic|basic-r|bidi-l|bidi-r
New 3.14 Selects the bidi algorithm to be used. With default the bidi mechanism is just activated (by default it is not), but every change must be marked up. In xetex and pdftex this is the only option.
In luatex, basic-r provides a simple and fast method for R text, which handles numbers and unmarked L text within an R context many in typical cases. New 3.19 Finally, basic supports both L and R text, and it is the preferred method (support for basic-r is currently limited). (They are named basic mainly because they only consider the intrinsic direction of scripts and weak directionality.)
New 3.29 In xetex, bidi-r and bidi-l resort to the package bidi (by Vafa Khalighi). Integration is still somewhat tentative, but it mostly works. For RL documents use the former, and for LR ones use the latter.
There are samples on GitHub, under /required/babel/samples. See particularly lua-bidibasic.tex and lua-secenum.tex.

EXAMPLE The following text comes from the Arabic Wikipedia (article about Arabia). Copy-pasting some text from the Wikipedia is a good way to test this feature. Remember basic is available in luatex only.

EXAMPLE With bidi=basic both L and R text can be mixed without explicit markup (the latter will be only necessary in some special cases where the Unicode algorithm fails). It is used much like bidi=basic-r, but with $R$ text inside $L$ text you may want to map the font so that the correct features are in force. This is accomplished with an option in \babelprovide, as illustrated:

In this example, and thanks to onchar=ids fonts, any Arabic letter (because the language is arabic) changes its font to that set for this language (here defined via *arabic, because Crimson does not provide Arabic letters).

NOTE Boxes are "black boxes". Numbers inside an \hbox (for example in a $\backslash r e f$ ) do not know anything about the surrounding chars. So, $\backslash \operatorname{ref}\{A\}-\backslash r e f\{B\}$ are not rendered in the visual order A-B, but in the wrong one B-A (because the hyphen does not "see" the digits inside the \hbox'es). If you need $\backslash r e f$ ranges, the best option is to define a dedicated macro like this (to avoid explicit direction changes in the body; here \texthe must be defined to select the main language):

In the future a more complete method, reading recursively boxed text, may be added.

New 3.16 To be expanded. Selects which layout elements are adapted in bidi documents, including some text elements (except with options loading the bidi package, which provides its own mechanism to control these elements). You may use several options with a dot-separated list (eg, layout=counters.contents.sectioning). This list will be expanded in future releases. Note not all options are required by all engines.
sectioning makes sure the sectioning macros are typeset in the main language, but with the title text in the current language (see below \BabelPatchSection for further details).
counters required in all engines (except luatex with bidi=basic) to reorder section numbers and the like (eg, 〈subsection〉. $\langle$ section $\rangle$ ); required in xetex and pdftex for counters in general, as well as in luatex with bidi=default; required in luatex for numeric footnote marks $>9$ with bidi=basic-r (but not with bidi=basic); note, however, it could depend on the counter format.

With counters, \arabic is not only considered L text always (with \babelsublr, see below), but also an "isolated" block which does not interact with the surrounding chars. So, while 1.2 in R text is rendered in that order with bidi=basic (as a decimal number), in \arabic\{c1\}. \arabic\{c2\} the visual order is c2.c1. Of course, you may always adjust the order by changing the language, if necessary ${ }^{18}$
lists required in xetex and pdftex, but only in bidirectional (with both R and L paragraphs) documents in luatex.

[^11]WARNING As of April 2019 there is a bug with \parshape in luatex (a $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ primitive) which makes lists to be horizontally misplaced if they are inside a \vbox (like minipage) and the current direction is different from the main one. A workaround is to restore the main language before the box and then set the local one inside.
contents required in xetex and pdftex; in luatex toc entries are R by default if the main language is R .
columns required in xetex and pdftex to reverse the column order (currently only the standard two-column mode); in luatex they are R by default if the main language is R (including multicol).
footnotes not required in monolingual documents, but it may be useful in bidirectional documents (with both $R$ and L paragraphs) in all engines; you may use alternatively $\backslash$ BabelFootnote described below (what this option does exactly is also explained there).
captions is similar to sectioning, but for \caption; not required in monolingual documents with luatex, but may be required in xetex and pdftex in some styles (support for the latter two engines is still experimental) New 3.18 .
tabular required in luatex for R tabular (it has been tested only with simple tables, so expect some readjustments in the future); ignored in pdftex or xetex (which will not support a similar option in the short term). It patches an internal command, so it might be ignored by some packages and classes (or even raise an error). New 3.18 .
graphics modifies the picture environment so that the whole figure is $L$ but the text is $R$. It does not work with the standard picture, and pict $2 e$ is required if you want sloped lines. It attempts to do the same for pgf/tikz. Somewhat experimental. New 3.32 . extras is used for miscellaneous readjustments which do not fit into the previous groups. Currently redefines in luatex \under line and \LaTeX2e New 3.19 .

There are three R blocks and two L blocks, and the order is RTL B and still ltr 1 ltr text RTL $A$. This is by design to provide the proper behavior in the most usual cases - but if you need to use \ref in an L text inside R, the L text must be marked up explictly; for example:

## $\{\langle$ section-name $\rangle$ \}

Mainly for bidi text, but it could be useful in other cases. \BabelPatchSection and the corresponding option layout=sectioning takes a more logical approach (at least in many cases) because it applies the global language to the section format (including the \chaptername in \chapter), while the section text is still the current language. The latter is passed to tocs and marks, too, and with sectioning in layout they both reset the "global" language to the main one, while the text uses the "local" language. With layout=sectioning all the standard sectioning commands are redefined (it also "isolates" the page number in heads, for a proper bidi behavior), but with this command you can set them individually if necessary (but note then tocs and marks are not touched).

There are more languages not listed above, including hindi, thai, thaicjk, latvian, turkmen, magyar, mongolian, romansh, lithuanian, spanglish, vietnamese, japanese, pinyin, arabic, farsi, ibygreek, bgreek, serbianc, frenchle, ethiop and friulan.
Most of them work out of the box, but some may require extra fonts, encoding files, a preprocessor or even a complete framework (like CJK or luatexja). For example, if you have got the velthuis/devnag package, you can create a file with extension .dn:

### 1.25 Unicode character properties in luatex

New 3.32 Part of the babel job is to apply Unicode rules to some script-specific features based on some properties. Currently, they are 3, namely, direction (ie, bidi class), mirroring glyphs, and line breaking for CJK scripts. These properties are stored in lua tables, which you can modify with the following macro (for example, to set them for glyphs in the PUA).

### 1.26 Tweaking some features

New 3.36 Sometimes you might need to disable some babel features. Currently this macro understands the following keys (and only for luatex), with values on or off: bidi.text, bidi.mirroring, bidi.mapdigits, layout.lists, layout.tabular, linebreak.sea, linebreak.cjk. For example, you can set \babeladjust\{bidi.text=off\} if you are using an alternative algorithm or with large sections not requiring it. With luahbtex you may need bidi.mirroring=off. Use with care, because these options do not deactivate other related options (like paragraph direction with bidi. text).

### 1.27 Tips, workarounds, known issues and notes

- If you use the document class book and you use \ref inside the argument of \chapter (or just use \ref inside \MakeUppercase), ${ }^{\text {AT }} T_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ will keep complaining about an undefined label. To prevent such problems, you could revert to using uppercase labels, you can use \lowercase\{\ref\{foo\}\} inside the argument of \chapter, or, if you will not use shorthands in labels, set the safe option to none or bib.
- Both Itxdoc and babel use \AtBeginDocument to change some catcodes, and babel reloads hhline to make sure : has the right one, so if you want to change the catcode of | it has to be done using the same method at the proper place, with
$\backslash$ AtBeginDocument $\{\backslash$ DeleteShortVerb $\{\backslash \mid\}\}$
before loading babel. This way, when the document begins the sequence is (1) make | active (ltxdoc); (2) make it unactive (your settings); (3) make babel shorthands active (babel); (4) reload hhline (babel, now with the correct catcodes for $\mid$ and :).
- Documents with several input encodings are not frequent, but sometimes are useful. You can set different encodings for different languages as the following example shows:

(A recent version of inputenc is required.)

- For the hyphenation to work correctly, lccodes cannot change, because $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ only takes into account the values when the paragraph is hyphenated, i.e., when it has been finished ${ }^{19}$ So, if you write a chunk of French text with $\backslash$ foreinglanguage, the apostrophes might not be taken into account. This is a limitation of $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, not of babel. Alternatively, you may use \useshorthands to activate ' and \defineshorthand, or redefine ’ (the latter is called by the non-ASCII right quote).
- \bibitem is out of sync with \selectlanguage in the .aux file. The reason is \bibitem uses \immediate (and others, in fact), while \selectlanguage doesn't. There is no known workaround.
- Babel does not take into account \normalsfcodes and (non-)French spacing is not always properly (un)set by languages. However, problems are unlikely to happen and therefore this part remains untouched in version 3.9 (but it is in the 'to do' list).

[^12]- Using a character mathematically active (ie, with math code "8000) as a shorthand can make $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ enter in an infinite loop in some rare cases. (Another issue in the 'to do' list, although there is a partial solution.)

The following packages can be useful, too (the list is still far from complete):
csquotes Logical markup for quotes.
iflang Tests correctly the current language.
hyphsubst Selects a different set of patterns for a language.
translator An open platform for packages that need to be localized.
siunitx Typesetting of numbers and physical quantities.
biblatex Programmable bibliographies and citations.
bicaption Bilingual captions.
babelbib Multilingual bibliographies.
microtype Adjusts the typesetting according to some languages (kerning and spacing).
Ligatures can be disabled.
substitutefont Combines fonts in several encodings.
mkpattern Generates hyphenation patterns.
tracklang Tracks which languages have been requested.
ucharclasses (xetex) Switches fonts when you switch from one Unicode block to another.
zhspacing Spacing for CJK documents in xetex.

### 1.28 Current and future work

The current work is focused on the so-called complex scripts in luatex. In 8-bit engines, babel provided a basic support for bidi text as part of the style for Hebrew, but it is somewhat unsatisfactory and internally replaces some hardwired commands by other hardwired commands (generic changes would be much better).
Useful additions would be, for example, time, currency, addresses and personal names ${ }^{20}$. But that is the easy part, because they don't require modifying the $\mathrm{EAT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ internals. Calendars (Arabic, Persian, Indic, etc.) are under study.
Also interesting are differences in the sentence structure or related to it. For example, in Basque the number precedes the name (including chapters), in Hungarian "from (1)" is "(1)-ből", but "from (3)" is "(3)-ból", in Spanish an item labelled "3. ${ }^{\circ}$ " may be referred to as either "ítem $3 .{ }^{\circ}$ " or " 3 . ${ }^{\text {er }}$ ítem", and so on.
An option to manage bidirectional document layout in luatex (lists, footnotes, etc.) is almost finished, but xetex required more work. Unfortunately, proper support for xetex requires patching somehow lots of macros and packages (and some issues related to \specials remain, like color and hyperlinks), so babel resorts to the bidi package (by Vafa Khalighi). See the babel repository for a small example (xe-bidi).

### 1.29 Tentative and experimental code

See the code section for \foreignlanguage* (a new starred version of \foreignlanguage).

## Old and deprecated stuff

A couple of tentative macros were provided by babel ( $\geq 3.9 \mathrm{~g}$ ) with a partial solution for "Unicode" fonts. These macros are now deprecated - use \babelfont. A short description follows, for reference:

- \babelFSstore\{〈babel-language〉\} sets the current three basic families (rm, sf, tt ) as the default for the language given.

[^13]- \babelFSdefault $\{\langle$ babel-language $\rangle\}\{\langle$ fontspec-features $\rangle\}$ patches $\backslash$ fontspec so that the given features are always passed as the optional argument or added to it (not an ideal solution).

## 2 Loading languages with language. dat

$\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ and most engines based on it (pdfT $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, xetex, $\epsilon-\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, the main exception being luatex) require hyphenation patterns to be preloaded when a format is created (eg, $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}, \mathrm{XeET} \mathrm{EX}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, pdfietex). babel provides a tool which has become standard in many distributions and based on a "configuration file" named language. dat. The exact way this file is used depends on the distribution, so please, read the documentation for the latter (note also some distributions generate the file with some tool).
New 3.9q With luatex, however, patterns are loaded on the fly when requested by the language (except the "0th" language, typically english, which is preloaded always) ${ }^{21}$ Until $3.9 n$, this task was delegated to the package luatex-hyphen, by Khaled Hosny, Élie Roux, and Manuel Pégourié-Gonnard, and required an extra file named language.dat.lua, but now a new mechanism has been devised based solely on language. dat. You must rebuild the formats if upgrading from a previous version. You may want to have a local language. dat for a particular project (for example, a book on Chemistry) ${ }^{22}$

### 2.1 Format

In that file the person who maintains a $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ environment has to record for which languages he has hyphenation patterns and in which files these are stored ${ }^{23}$. When hyphenation exceptions are stored in a separate file this can be indicated by naming that file after the file with the hyphenation patterns.
The file can contain empty lines and comments, as well as lines which start with an equals (=) sign. Such a line will instruct $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ that the hyphenation patterns just processed have to be known under an alternative name. Here is an example:

You may also set the font encoding the patterns are intended for by following the language name by a colon and the encoding code ${ }^{24}$ For example:

With the previous settings，if the encoding when the language is selected is T 1 then the patterns in hyphenT1．ger are used，but otherwise use those in hyphen．ger（note the encoding could be set in \extras $\langle$ lang $\rangle$ ）．
A typical error when using babel is the following：

It simply means you must reconfigure language．dat，either by hand or with the tools provided by your distribution．

## 3 The interface between the core of babel and the language definition files

The language definition files（ldf）must conform to a number of conventions，because these files have to fill in the gaps left by the common code in babel．def，i．e．，the definitions of the macros that produce texts．Also the language－switching possibility which has been built into the babel system has its implications．
The following assumptions are made：
－Some of the language－specific definitions might be used by plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ users，so the files have to be coded so that they can be read by both ${ }^{E} T_{E} \mathrm{X}$ and plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ ．The current format can be checked by looking at the value of the macro \fmtname．
－The common part of the babel system redefines a number of macros and environments （defined previously in the document style）to put in the names of macros that replace the previously hard－wired texts．These macros have to be defined in the language definition files．
－The language definition files must define five macros，used to activate and deactivate the language－specific definitions．These macros are \〈lang〉hyphenmins， \captions〈lang〉，\date〈lang〉，\extras〈lang〉 and \noextras〈lang〉（the last two may be left empty）；where $\langle l a n g\rangle$ is either the name of the language definition file or the name of the $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ option that is to be used．These macros and their functions are discussed below．You must define all or none for a language（or a dialect）；defining，say， \date〈lang〉 but not \captions〈lang〉 does not raise an error but can lead to unexpected results．
－When a language definition file is loaded，it can define \l＠〈lang〉 to be a dialect of \language0 when \l＠〈lang〉 is undefined．
－Language names must be all lowercase．If an unknown language is selected，babel will attempt setting it after lowercasing its name．
－The semantics of modifiers is not defined（on purpose）．In most cases，they will just be simple separated options（eg，spanish），but a language might require，say，a set of options organized as a tree with suboptions（in such a case，the recommended separator is／）．

Some recommendations：
－The preferred shorthand is＂，which is not used in $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$（quotes are entered as＂ and ＇＇）．Other good choices are characters which are not used in a certain context（eg，＝in an ancient language）．Note however $=,<,>,:$ and the like can be dangerous，because they may be used as part of the syntax of some elements（numeric expressions， key／value pairs，etc．）．
－Captions should not contain shorthands or encoding－dependent commands（the latter is not always possible，but should be clearly documented）．They should be defined using the LICR．You may also use the new tools for encoded strings，described below．
－Avoid adding things to \noextras〈lang〉 except for umlauthigh and friends， \bbl＠deactivate，\bbl＠（non）frenchspacing，and language－specific macros．Use always，if possible，\bbl＠save and \bbl＠savevariable（except if you still want to have access to the previous value）．Do not reset a macro or a setting to a hardcoded value． Never．Instead save its value in \extras〈lang〉．
－Do not switch scripts．If you want to make sure a set of glyphs is used，switch either the font encoding（low－level）or the language（high－level，which in turn may switch the font encoding）．Usage of things like \latintext is deprecated ${ }^{25}$
－Please，for＂private＂internal macros do not use the \bbl＠prefix．It is used by babel and it can lead to incompatibilities．

There are no special requirements for documenting your language files．Now they are not included in the base babel manual，so provide a standalone document suited for your needs，as well as other files you think can be useful．A PDF and a＂readme＂are strongly recommended．

## 3．1 Guidelines for contributed languages

Now language files are＂outsourced＂and are located in a separate directory （／macros／latex／contrib／babel－contrib），so that they are contributed directly to CTAN （please，do not send to me language styles just to upload them to CTAN）．
Of course，placing your style files in this directory is not mandatory，but if you want to do it，here are a few guidelines．
－Do not hesitate stating on the file heads you are the author and the maintainer，if you actually are．There is no need to state the babel maintainer（s）as authors if they have not contributed significantly to your language files．
－Fonts are not strictly part of a language，so they are best placed in the corresponding TeX tree．This includes not only tfm，vf，ps1，otf，mf files and the like，but also fd ones．
－Font and input encodings are usually best placed in the corresponding tree，too，but sometimes they belong more naturally to the babel style．Note you may also need to define a LICR．
－Babel ldf files may just interface a framework，as it happens often with Oriental languages／scripts．This framework is best placed in its own directory．

configuration file. This file can, for instance, be used to add strings to \captions $\langle$ lang $\rangle$ to support local document classes. The user will be informed that this configuration file has been loaded. This macro is called by \ldf@finish.
\substitutefontfamily
(Deprecated.) This command takes three arguments, a font encoding and two font family names. It creates a font description file for the first font in the given encoding. This .fd file will instruct $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ to use a font from the second family when a font from the first family in the given encoding seems to be needed.

### 3.3 Skeleton

Here is the basic structure of an ldf file, with a language, a dialect and an attribute. Strings are best defined using the method explained in sec. 3.8 (babel 3.9 and later).

## 3．4 Support for active characters

In quite a number of language definition files，active characters are introduced．To facilitate this，some support macros are provided．

\bbl＠activate \bbl＠deactivate

 It is used to set text＇verbatim＇．To make this work if more characters get a special category code，you have to add this character to the macro \dospecial． $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ adds another macro called \＠sanitize representing the same character set，but without the curly braces．The macros \bbl＠add＠special〈char〉 and \bbl＠remove＠special〈char〉 add and remove the character $\langle$ char $\rangle$ to these two sets．

## 3．5 Support for saving macro definitions

Language definition files may want to redefine macros that already exist．Therefore a mechanism for saving（and restoring）the original definition of those macros is provided． We provide two macros for this ${ }^{26}$ ．
\babel＠save To save the current meaning of any control sequence，the macro \babel＠save is provided． It takes one argument，〈csname〉，the control sequence for which the meaning has to be saved．
\babel＠savevariable
A second macro is provided to save the current value of a variable．In this context， anything that is allowed after the \the primitive is considered to be a variable．The macro takes one argument，the $\langle$ variable $\rangle$ ．
The effect of the preceding macros is to append a piece of code to the current definition of \originalTeX．When \originalTeX is expanded，this code restores the previous definition of the control sequence or the previous value of the variable．

## 3．6 Support for extending macros

\addto The macro \addto $\{\langle$ control sequence $\rangle\}\left\{\left\langle T_{E} X\right.\right.$ code $\left.\rangle\right\}$ can be used to extend the definition of

[^16]a macro．The macro need not be defined（ie，it can be undefined or \relax）．This macro can，for instance，be used in adding instructions to a macro like \extrasenglish． Be careful when using this macro，because depending on the case the assignment could be either global（usually）or local（sometimes）．That does not seem very consistent，but this behavior is preserved for backward compatibility．If you are using etoolbox，by Philipp Lehman，consider using the tools provided by this package instead of \addto．

In several languages compound words are used．This means that when $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ has to hyphenate such a compound word，it only does so at the＇－＇that is used in such words．To allow hyphenation in the rest of such a compound word，the macro \bbl＠allowhyphens can be used．
Same as \bbl＠allowhyphens，but does nothing if the encoding is T1．It is intended mainly for characters provided as real glyphs by this encoding but constructed with \accent in OT1．
 discretionaries）than this one（composite chars）．Note also prior to version 3．7， \allowhyphens had the behavior of \bbl＠allowhyphens．
For some languages，quotes need to be lowered to the baseline．For this purpose the macro \set＠low＠box is available．It takes one argument and puts that argument in an \hbox，at the baseline．The result is available in $\backslash$ box 0 for further processing．
Sometimes it is necessary to preserve the \spacefactor．For this purpose the macro \save＠sf＠q is available．It takes one argument，saves the current spacefactor，executes the argument，and restores the spacefactor．
The commands \bbl＠frenchspacing and \bbl＠nonfrenchspacing can be used to properly switch French spacing on and off．

## 3．8 Encoding－dependent strings

New 3．9a Babel 3.9 provides a way of defining strings in several encodings，intended mainly for luatex and xetex．This is the only new feature requiring changes in language files if you want to make use of it．
Furthermore，it must be activated explicitly，with the package option strings．If there is no strings，these blocks are ignored，except \SetCases（and except if forced as described below）．In other words，the old way of defining／switching strings still works and it＇s used by default．
It consist is a series of blocks started with \StartBabelCommands．The last block is closed with \EndBabelCommands．Each block is a single group（ie，local declarations apply until the next \StartBabelCommands or \EndBabelCommands）．An ldf may contain several series of this kind．
Thanks to this new feature，string values and string language switching are not mixed any more．No need of \addto．If the language is french，just redefine $\backslash f r e n c h c h a p t e r n a m e$.

The 〈language－list〉 specifies which languages the block is intended for．A block is taken into account only if the \CurrentOption is listed here．Alternatively，you can define $\backslash$ BabelLanguages to a comma－separated list of languages to be defined（if undefined， \StartBabelCommands sets it to \CurrentOption）．You may write \CurrentOption as the language，but this is discouraged－a explicit name（or names）is much better and clearer． A＂selector＂is a name to be used as value in package option strings，optionally followed by extra info about the encodings to be used．The name unicode must be used for xetex and luatex（the key strings has also other two special values：generic and encoded）．

If a string is set several times (because several blocks are read), the first one takes precedence (ie, it works much like \providecommand).
Encoding info is charset= followed by a charset, which if given sets how the strings should be translated to the internal representation used by the engine, typically utf8, which is the only value supported currently (default is no translations). Note charset is applied by luatex and xetex when reading the file, not when the macro or string is used in the document.
A list of font encodings which the strings are expected to work with can be given after fontenc $=$ (separated with spaces, if two or more) - recommended, but not mandatory, although blocks without this key are not taken into account if you have requested strings=encoded.
Blocks without a selector are read always if the key strings has been used. They provide fallback values, and therefore must be the last blocks; they should be provided always if possible and all strings should be defined somehow inside it; they can be the only blocks (mainly LGC scripts using the LICR). Blocks without a selector can be activated explicitly with strings=generic (no block is taken into account except those). With strings=encoded, strings in those blocks are set as default (internally, ?). With strings=encoded strings are protected, but they are correctly expanded in \MakeUppercase and the like. If there is no key strings, string definitions are ignored, but $\backslash$ SetCases are still honored (in a encoded way).
The $\langle$ category $\rangle$ is either captions, date or extras. You must stick to these three categories, even if no error is raised when using other name ${ }^{27}$ It may be empty, too, but in such a case using $\backslash$ SetString is an error (but not $\backslash$ SetCase).

When used in ldf files，previous values of $\backslash\langle$ category $\rangle\langle$ language $\rangle$ are overridden，which means the old way to define strings still works and used by default（to be precise，is first set to undefined and then strings are added）．However，when used in the preamble or in a package，new settings are added to the previous ones，if the language exists（in the babel sense，ie，if \date〈language〉 exists）．

New 3.9 g Case mapping serves in $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ for two unrelated purposes: case transforms (upper/lower) and hyphenation. \SetCase handles the former, while hyphenation is handled by \SetHyphenMap and controlled with the package option hyphenmap. So, even if internally they are based on the same $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ primitive ( $\backslash l$ ccode), babel sets them separately. There are three helper macros to be used inside \SetHyphenMap:

- \BabelLower $\{\langle$ uccode $\rangle\}\{\langle$ lccode $\rangle\}$ is similar to \lccode but it’s ignored if the char has been set and saves the original lccode to restore it when switching the language (except with hyphenmap=first).
- \BabelLowerMM $\{\langle$ uccode-from $\rangle\}\{\langle$ uccode-to $\rangle\}\{\langle$ step $\rangle\}\{\langle$ lccode-from $\rangle\}$ loops though the given uppercase codes, using the step, and assigns them the lccode, which is also increased (MM stands for many-to-many).
- \BabelLowerMO\{〈uccode-from $\rangle\}\{\langle$ uccode-to $\rangle\}\{\langle$ step $\rangle\}\{\langle$ lccode $\rangle\}$ loops though the given uppercase codes, using the step, and assigns them the lccode, which is fixed (MO stands for many-to-one).

An example is (which is redundant, because these assignments are done by both luatex and xetex):

This macro is not intended to fix wrong mappings done by Unicode (which are the default in both xetex and luatex) - if an assignment is wrong, fix it directly.

## 4 Changes

### 4.1 Changes in babel version 3.9

Most of the changes in version 3.9 were related to bugs, either to fix them (there were lots), or to provide some alternatives. Even new features like \babelhyphen are intended to solve a certain problem (in this case, the lacking of a uniform syntax and behavior for shorthands across languages). These changes are described in this manual in the corresponding place. A selective list follows:

- \select@language did not set \languagename. This meant the language in force when auxiliary files were loaded was the one used in, for example, shorthands - if the language was german, a \select@language\{spanish\} had no effect.
- \foreignlanguage and otherlanguage* messed up \extras<language>. Scripts, encodings and many other things were not switched correctly.
- The : ENC mechanism for hyphenation patterns used the encoding of the previous language, not that of the language being selected.
- ' (with activeacute) had the original value when writing to an auxiliary file, and things like an infinite loop could happen. It worked incorrectly with $\wedge$ (if activated) and also if deactivated.
- Active chars where not reset at the end of language options, and that lead to incompatibilities between languages.
- \textormath raised and error with a conditional.
- \aliasshorthand didn’t work (or only in a few and very specific cases).
- \l@english was defined incorrectly (using \let instead of \chardef).
- ldf files not bundled with babel were not recognized when called as global options.


## Part II

## Source code

babel is being developed incrementally, which means parts of the code are under development and therefore incomplete. Only documented features are considered complete. In other words, use babel only as documented (except, of course, if you want to explore and test them - you can post suggestions about multilingual issues to kadingira@tug.org on http://tug.org/mailman/listinfo/kadingira).

## 5 Identification and loading of required files

Code documentation is still under revision.
The babel package after unpacking consists of the following files:
switch.def defines macros to set and switch languages.
babel.def defines the rest of macros. It has tow parts: a generic one and a second one only for LaTeX.
babel.sty is the ETEX package, which set options and load language styles.
plain.def defines some $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ macros required by babel. def and provides a few tools for Plain.
hyphen.cfg is the file to be used when generating the formats to load hyphenation patterns. By default it also loads switch.def.

The babel installer extends docstrip with a few "pseudo-guards" to set "variables" used at installation time. They are used with <@name@> at the appropiated places in the source code and shown below with $\langle\langle n a m e\rangle\rangle$. That brings a little bit of literate programming.

## 6 locale directory

A required component of babel is a set of ini files with basic definitions for about 200 languages. They are distributed as a separate zip file, not packed as dtx. With them, babel will fully support Unicode engines.
Most of them are essentially finished (except bugs and mistakes, of course). Some of them are still incomplete (but they will be usable), and there are some omissions (eg, Latin and polytonic Greek, and there are no geographic areas in Spanish). Hindi, French, Occitan and Breton will show a warning related to dates. Not all include LICR variants.
This is a preliminary documentation.
ini files contain the actual data; tex files are currently just proxies to the corresponding ini files.
Most keys are self-explanatory.
charset the encoding used in the ini file.
version of the ini file
level "version" of the ini specification. which keys are available (they may grow in a compatible way) and how they should be read.
encodings a descriptive list of font encondings.
[captions] section of captions in the file charset
[captions.licr] same, but in pure ASCII using the LICR
date.long fields are as in the CLDR, but the syntax is different. Anything inside brackets is a date field (eg, MMMM for the month name) and anything outside is text. In addition, [ ] is a non breakable space and [.] is an abbreviation dot.

Keys may be further qualified in a particular language with a suffix starting with a uppercase letter. It can be just a letter (eg, babel.name.A, babel.name.B) or a name (eg, date.long.Nominative, date.long.Formal, but no language is currently using the latter). Multi-letter qualifiers are forward compatible in the sense they won't conflict with new "global" keys (all lowercase).

Now we make sure all required files are loaded. When the command $\backslash$ AtBeginDocument doesn't exist we assume that we are dealing with a plain-based format or $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X} 2.09$. ## 9 The kernel of Babel (babel. def, common)

The kernel of the babel system is stored in either hyphen.cfg or switch.def and babel.def. The file babel. def contains most of the code, while switch. def defines the language-switching commands; both can be read at run time. The file hyphen.cfg is a file that can be loaded into the format, which is necessary when you want to be able to switch hyphenation patterns (by default, it also inputs switch. def, for "historical reasons", but it is not necessary). When babel. def is loaded it checks if the current version of switch. def is in the format; if not, it is loaded. A further file, babel. sty, contains ${ }^{2} T_{E} \mathrm{X}$-specific stuff. Because plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ users might want to use some of the features of the babel system too, care has to be taken that plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ can process the files. For this reason the current format will have to be checked in a number of places. Some of the code below is common to plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ and $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, some of it is for the $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ case only.
Plain formats based on etex (etex, xetex, luatex) don't load hyphen. cfg but etex. src, which follows a different naming convention, so we need to define the babel names. It presumes language. def exists and it is the same file used when formats were created.

### 9.3 Setting up language files

\Ldfinit The second version of $\backslash L d f$ Init macro takes two arguments. The first argument is the name of the language that will be defined in the language definition file; the second argument is either a control sequence or a string from which a control sequence should be constructed. The existence of the control sequence indicates that the file has been processed before.
At the start of processing a language definition file we always check the category code of the at-sign. We make sure that it is a 'letter' during the processing of the file. We also save its name as the last called option, even if not loaded.
Another character that needs to have the correct category code during processing of language definition files is the equals sign, ' $=$ ’, because it is sometimes used in constructions with the \let primitive. Therefore we store its current catcode and restore it later on.
Now we check whether we should perhaps stop the processing of this file. To do this we first need to check whether the second argument that is passed to \LdfInit is a control sequence. We do that by looking at the first token after passing \#2 through string. When it is equal to \@backslashchar we are dealing with a control sequence which we can compare with \@undefined.
If so, we call \ldf@quit to set the main language, restore the category code of the @-sign and call \endinput
When \#2 was not a control sequence we construct one and compare it with \relax. Finally we check \originalTeX.

## 9．6 Support for saving macro definitions

### 9.11.4 Umlauts and tremas

For German for instance, the 'umlaut' should be positioned lower than the default position for placing it over the letters a, o, u, A, O and U. ### 11.1 The redefinition of the style commands

The rest of the code in this file can only be processed by $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, so we check the current format. If it is plain $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$, processing should stop here. But, because of the need to limit the scope of the definition of \format, a macro that is used locally in the following \if statement, this comparison is done inside a group. To prevent $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ from complaining about an unclosed group, the processing of the command \endinput is deferred until after the group is closed. This is accomplished by the command \aftergroup.

### 11.2 Cross referencing macros

The $\mathrm{ET}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ book states:
The key argument is any sequence of letters, digits, and punctuation symbols; upperand lowercase letters are regarded as different.

When the above quote should still be true when a document is typeset in a language that has active characters, special care has to be taken of the category codes of these characters when they appear in an argument of the cross referencing macros.
When a cross referencing command processes its argument, all tokens in this argument should be character tokens with category 'letter' or 'other'.
The only way to accomplish this in most cases is to use the trick described in the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{Xbook}$ [4] (Appendix D, page 382). The primitive \meaning applied to a token expands to the current meaning of this token. For example, '\meaning $\backslash A$ ' with $\backslash A$ defined as ' $\backslash$ def $\backslash \mathrm{A} \# 1\{\backslash \mathrm{~B}\}$ ' expands to the characters 'macro:\#1->\B’ with all category codes set to 'other' or 'space’.

### 11.3 Marks

### 11.5 Encoding and fonts

Because documents may use non-ASCII font encodings, we make sure that the logos of $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ and $\mathrm{EAT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ always come out in the right encoding. There is a list of non-ASCII encodings. \subsection*{11.6 Basic bidi support}

Work in progress. This code is currently placed here for practical reasons. It is loosely based on rlbabel. def, but most of it has been developed from scratch. This babel module (by Johannes Braams and Boris Lavva) has served the purpose of typesetting R documents for two decades, and despite its flaws I think it is still a good starting point (some parts have been copied here almost verbatim), partly thanks to its simplicity. I've also looked at arabi (by Youssef Jabri), which is compatible with babel.
There are two ways of modifying macros to make them "bidi", namely, by patching the internal low-level macros (which is what I have done with lists, columns, counters, tocs, much like rlbabel did), and by introducing a "middle layer" just below the user interface (sectioning, footnotes).
- pdftex provides a minimal support for bidi text, and it must be done by hand. Vertical typesetting is not possible.
- xetex is somewhat better, thanks to its font engine (even if not always reliable) and a few additional tools. However, very little is done at the paragraph level. Another challenging problem is text direction does not honour \(\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}\) grouping.
- Iuatex can provide the most complete solution, as we can manipulate almost freely the node list, the generated lines, and so on, but bidi text does not work out of the box and some development is necessary. It also provides tools to properly set left-to-right and right-to-left page layouts. As LuaTEX-ja shows, vertical typesetting is possible, too.

\section*{13 Loading hyphenation patterns}

The following code is meant to be read by iniT \(T_{E} X\) because it should instruct \(T_{E} X\) to read hyphenation patterns. To this end the docstrip option patterns can be used to include this code in the file hyphen. cfg. Code is written with lower level macros. The code above redefines the control sequence \everyjob in order to be able to add something to the current contents of the register. This is necessary because the processing of hyphenation patterns happens long before \(\mathrm{ETE}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}\) fills the register.

There are some problems with this approach though.
- When someone wants to use several hyphenation patterns with SLTEX the above scheme won't work. The reason is that SLITEX overwrites the contents of the \everyjob register with its own message.
- Plain \(\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}\) does not use the \everyjob register so the message would not be displayed.

To circumvent this a 'dirty trick' can be used. As this code is only processed when creating a new format file there is one command that is sure to be used, \dump. Therefore the original \dump is saved in \org@dump and a new definition is supplied.
To make sure that ETEX 2.09 executes the \@begindocumenthook we would want to alter \begin\{document\}, but as this done too often already, we add the new code at the front of } \@preamblecmds. But we can only do that after it has been defined, so we add this piece of code to \dump.
This new definition starts by adding an instruction to write a message on the terminal and in the transcript file to inform the user of the preloaded hyphenation patterns.
Then everything is restored to the old situation and the format is dumped.

The macro \process@language is used to process a non-empty line from the 'configuration file'. It has three arguments, each delimited by white space. The first argument is the 'name' of a language; the second is the name of the file that contains the patterns. The optional third argument is the name of a file containing hyphenation exceptions. For some hyphenation patterns it is needed to load them with a specific font encoding selected. This can be specified in the file language. dat by adding for instance ':T1' to the name of the language. The macro \bbl@get@enc extracts the font encoding from the language name and stores it in \bbl@hyph@enc. The latter can be used in hyphenation files if you need to set a behavior depending on the given encoding (it is set to empty if no encoding is given).
Pattern files may contain assignments to \lefthyphenmin and \(\backslash r i g h t h y p h e n m i n . ~ \mathrm{~T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}\) does not keep track of these assignments. Therefore we try to detect such assignments and store them in the \(\backslash\langle l a n g\rangle\) hyphenmins macro. When no assignments were made we provide a default setting.
Some pattern files contain changes to the \lccode en \uccode arrays. Such changes should remain local to the language; therefore we process the pattern file in a group; the \patterns command acts globally so its effect will be remembered.

When the hyphenation patterns have been processed we need to see if a file with hyphenation exceptions needs to be read. This is the case when the third argument is not empty and when it does not contain a space token. (Note however there is no need to save hyphenation exceptions into the format.)

### 15.1 XeTeX

Unfortunately, the current encoding cannot be retrieved and therefore it is reset always to utf8, which seems a sensible default.
$\mathrm{ER}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ sets many "codes" just before loading hyphen. cfg. That is not a problem in luatex, but in xetex they must be reset to the proper value. Most of the work is done in xe(la)tex.ini, so here we just "undo" some of the changes done by EATEX. Anyway, for consistency LuaTEX also resets the catcodes.

### 15.3 LuaTeX

The new loader for luatex is based solely on language.dat, which is read on the fly. The code shouldn’t be executed when the format is build, so we check if \AddBabelHook is defined. Then comes a modified version of the loader in hyphen. cfg (without the hyphenmins stuff, which is under the direct control of babel).
The names $\backslash 1 @<l a n g u a g e>$ are defined and take some value from the beginning because all ldf files assume this for the corresponding language to be considered valid, but patterns are not loaded (except the first one). This is done later, when the language is first selected (which usually means when the ldf finishes). If a language has been loaded, \bbl@hyphendata@<num> exists (with the names of the files read).
The default setup preloads the first language into the format. This is intended mainly for 'english', so that it's available without further intervention from the user. To avoid duplicating it, the following rule applies: if the "0th" language and the first language in language. dat have the same name then just ignore the latter. If there are new synonymous, the are added, but note if the language patterns have not been preloaded they won't at run time.
Other preloaded languages could be read twice, if they have been preloaded into the format. This is not optimal, but it shouldn't happen very often - with luatex patterns are best loaded when the document is typeset, and the "0th" language is preloaded just for backwards compatibility.
As of 1.1b, lua(e)tex is taken into account. Formerly, loading of patterns on the fly didn't work in this format, but with the new loader it does. Unfortunately, the format is not based on babel, and data could be duplicated, because languages are reassigned above those in the format (nothing serious, anyway). Note even with this format language. dat is used (under the principle of a single source), instead of language.def. Of course, there is room for improvements, like tools to read and reassign languages, which would require modifying the language list, and better error handling. We need catcode tables, but no format (targeted by babel) provide a command to allocate them (although there are packages like ctablestack). For the moment, a dangerous approach is used - just allocate a high random number and cross the fingers. To complicate things, etex.sty changes the way languages are allocated.

### 15.5 CJK line breaking

Minimal line breaking for CJK scripts, mainly intended for simple documents and short texts as a secundary language. Only line breaking, with a little stretching for justification, without any attempt to adjust the spacing. It is based on (but does not strictly follow) the Unicode algorithm.
We first need a little table with the corresponding line breaking properties. A few characters have an additional key for the width (fullwidth vs. halfwidth), not yet used. There is a separate file, defined below.

### 15.6 Automatic fonts and ids switching

After defining the blocks for a number of scripts (must be extended and very likely fine tuned), we define a short function which just traverse the node list to carry out the replacements. The table loc_to_scr gets the locale form a script range (note the locale is the key, and that there is an intermediate table built on the fly for optimization). This locale is then used to get the \language and the \localeid as stored in locale_props, as well as the font (as requested). In the latter table a key starting with / maps the font from the global one (the key) to the local one (the value). Maths are skipped and discretionaries are handled in a special way.

Post-handling hyphenation patterns for non-standard rules, like ff to ff-f. There are still some issues with speed (not very slow, but still slow).
After declaring the table containing the patterns with their replacements, we define some auxiliary functions: str_to_nodes converts the string returned by a function to a node list, taking the node at base as a model (font, language, etc.); fetch_word fetches a series of glyphs and discretionaries, which pattern is matched against (if there is a match, it is called again before trying other patterns, and this is very likely the main bottleneck). post_hyphenate_replace is the callback applied after tex. hyphenate. This means the automatic hyphenation points are known. As empty captures return a byte position (as
explained in the luatex manual), we must convert it to a utf8 position. With first, the last byte can be the leading byte in a utf8 sequence, so we just remove it and add 1 to the resulting length. With last we must take into account the capture position points to the next character. Here word_head points to the starting node of the text to be matched.

Now the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ high level interface, which requires the function defined above for converting strings to functions returning a string. These functions handle the $\{n\}$ syntax. For example, pre=\{1\}\{1\}- becomes function(m) return m[1]..m[1]..'-' end, wherem are the matches returned after applying the pattern. With a mapped capture the functions are similar to function(m) return Babel.capt_map(m[1],1) end, where the last argument identifies the mapping to be applied to $\mathrm{m}[1]$. The way it is carried out is somewhat tricky, but the effect in not dissimilar to lua load - save the code as string in a TeX macro, and expand this macro at the appropriate place. As \directlua does not take into account the current catcode of @, we just avoid this character in macro names (which explains the internal group, too).

### 15.7 Layout

## Work in progress.

Unlike xetex, luatex requires only minimal changes for right-to-left layouts, particularly in monolingual documents (the engine itself reverses boxes - including column order or headings -, margins, etc.) with bidi=basic, without having to patch almost any macro where text direction is relevant.
\@hangfrom is useful in many contexts and it is redefined always with the layout option. There are, however, a number of issues when the text direction is not the same as the box direction (as set by \bodydir), and when \parbox and \hangindent are involved.
Fortunately, latest releases of luatex simplify a lot the solution with \shapemode.
With the issue \#15 I realized commands are best patched, instead of redefined. With a few lines, a modification could be applied to several classes and packages. Now, tabular seems to work (at least in simple cases) with array, tabularx, hhline, colortbl, longtable, booktabs, etc. However, dcolumn still fails.

### 15.8 Auto bidi with basic and basic-r

Now the basic-r bidi mode. One of the aims is to implement a fast and simple bidi algorithm, with a single loop. I managed to do it for R texts, with a second smaller loop for a special case. The code is still somewhat chaotic, but its behavior is essentially correct. I cannot resist copying the following text from Emacs bidi. c (which also attempts to implement the bidi algorithm with a single loop):

Arrrgh!! The UAX\#9 algorithm is too deeply entrenched in the assumption of batch-style processing [...]. May the fleas of a thousand camels infest the armpits of those who design supposedly general-purpose algorithms by looking at their own implementations, and fail to consider other possible implementations!

Well, it took me some time to guess what the batch rules in UAX\#9 actually mean (in other word, what they do and why, and not only how), but I think (or I hope) I've managed to understand them.
In some sense, there are two bidi modes, one for numbers, and the other for text.
Furthermore, setting just the direction in R text is not enough, because there are actually two R modes (set explicitly in Unicode with RLM and ALM). In babel the dir is set by a higher protocol based on the language/script, which in turn sets the correct dir (<l>, <r> or <al>).
From UAX\#9: "Where available, markup should be used instead of the explicit formatting characters". So, this simple version just ignores formatting characters. Actually, most of that annex is devoted to how to handle them.
BD14-BD16 are not implemented. Unicode (and the W3C) are making a great effort to deal with some special problematic cases in "streamed" plain text. I don’t think this is the way to go - particular issues should be fixed by a high level interface taking into account the needs of the document. And here is where luatex excels, because everything related to bidi writing is under our control.

As Don Knuth has declared that the filename hyphen. tex may only be used to designate his version of the american English hyphenation patterns, a new solution has to be found in order to be able to load hyphenation patterns for other languages in a plain-based \(\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}\)-format. When asked he responded:

That file name is "sacred", and if anybody changes it they will cause severe upward/downward compatibility headaches.
People can have a file localhyphen.tex or whatever they like, but they mustn't diddle with hyphen.tex (or plain.tex except to preload additional fonts).

The files bplain.tex and blplain.tex can be used as replacement wrappers around plain. tex and lplain. tex to acheive the desired effect, based on the babel package. If you load each of them with iniTEX, you will get a file called either bplain.fmt or blplain.fmt, which you can use as replacements for plain.fmt and lplain.fmt. As these files are going to be read as the first thing initeX sees, we need to set some category codes just to be able to change the definition of \input
