

The ccicons package*

Abstract

This package offers authors who want to publish their documents under a Creative Commons license an easy way to include the relevant icons in their documents.

1 Introduction

Creative Commons (<http://creativecommons.org>) licenses have become increasingly popular for authors who want to retain their copyright but give other people the possibility to share and build upon their work. For each of the licenses that Creative Commons offers, there exists a set of icons that can be used to identify the respective license. This package defines several commands that allow to typeset these icons. Since the icons are stored in a PostScript Type 1 font, they can be scaled freely without diminishing their visual appearance.

2 Usage

To use this package in your L^AT_EX document, you need to issue

```
\usepackage{ccicons}
```

in the preamble of your document. This makes available the following commands to typeset the icons provided by Creative Commons:

3 The main style file

We provide one internal command to access the characters of the font directly.

The following commands provide high-level access to the font. We define a command for each character in the font.
